



The Associate of Arts degree (A.A.) at JCCC is a general transfer degree and partners with the first two years of most bachelor degree programs. Students pursuing the A.A. may select courses that satisfy both the A.A. degree requirements and lower division requirements for a bachelor's degree at four-year institutions. The 33 hours of electives within the A.A. allows students to complete additional general education and lower division courses required for specific majors. The A.A. degree requires completion of 64 credit hours, the maximum number of hours from a community college that will be applied toward a bachelor's degree at most four-year schools. Meeting with a JCCC counselor is strongly recommended for selection of appropriate courses.

- ❖ Submit an application to KU through the Office of Admissions and Scholarships, indicating Social Welfare choice. Also submit a B.S.W. application available from 107 Twente Hall or online at www.socwel.ku.edu/Admissions/BSW. To request an application packet, call (785) 864-8976 or e-mail admissionsbsw@ku.edu.
- ❖ A minimum 2.5 GPA also required on at least 30 hours of coursework, including math and English Composition I and II to apply. Applications should be submitted at least two weeks prior to the following review dates: February 1, October 1 or June 1. Students are admitted for fall semester only.
- ❖ Sixty-four credits may be transferred to KU from community colleges. A minimum of 124 credit hours of course work, including 10 credit hours of field practicum, is required for graduation. At least 24 of the last 30 credit hours must be taken at KU; 45 junior/senior level credit hours are required.
- ❖ Pass/Fail Policy - Not allowable for any required SW (prefix) courses.
- ❖ Students may complete the BSW degree by taking evening classes through the BSW completion program offered at Kansas City Kansas Community College. Contact Maxine Elmore at (913) 288-7304 or melmore1@ku.edu.
